

MCC canned meat in Malawi

Samuel Haki Innocent, 25, is from the Democratic Republic of the Congo (DR Congo). He fled with his family from Uvira, in South Kivu, nearly seven years ago. They are living in the Dzaleka Refugee Camp in Dowa, Malawi, in southeastern Africa.

In DR Congo, "My sister and father, who have albinism like me, were killed

because they are albinos," Samuel said. "We cannot even consider going back to our home in Uvira."

Initially, what is now Dzaleka Refugee Camp held political prisoners. In 1993, Malawi closed the prison and welcomed refugees.

Dzaleka is designed to host 10,000 people; more than 52,000 live there.

MCC and its partner Mennonite Brethren Church in Malawi provide 11,520 cans of meat to Dzaleka each year.

Samuel's family prepares the chicken with onions and tomatoes. "My family only eats meat when there is a distribution of canned meat," Samuel said. "We love the meat." They eat it with *nsima*, a patty made of corn flour.

In addition to chicken, Samuel and his family have received soap from MCC. "As a person with albinism, the soap is especially important to me," said Samuel. "But two bars of soap are not enough – they don't last me a whole year." Samuel wishes for a project to teach him and others how to make soap.

"I pray to God every day that God will improve our situation. I know my prayers will reach God," said Samuel. "Even before I came out of my mother's womb, God knew everything about me and the difficulties I would face in life."

Samuel and his family would rather not be on the receiving end all of the time. He'd like to learn to make enough soap so that he could sell some. Similarly, he asked for help in acquiring chickens. "When you feed us it's for a day, but if we had chickens, we could do more" and have meat more often, he said.

In the meantime, Samuel remains grateful. "Thank you for listening and thank you for caring enough to bring us resources."
